# Canine Heat Stroke (Hyperthermia) Submitted by: Barb Blacksher

Heat stroke or hyperthermia is a term which describes an elevation in body temperature. It occurs when an animal gets severely overheated, most commonly during warm weather or due to overexertion. The normal body temperature of a dog ranges from 100.2 – 102.8 degrees Fahrenheit. A rectal temperature over 104 degrees requires action, and over 106 degrees is a dire emergency.

Dogs do not sweat through their skin as humans do. They release body heat primarily by panting, although they do sweat through their foot pads and nose. When a dog cannot effectively expel heat, its internal temperature begins to rise. The following information can help you to identify common causes of heat stroke, to recognize the symptoms of heat stroke, and to properly treat and animal with hyperthermia.

# **RISK FACTORS:**

- Black or dark-colored dogs
- Obesity
- Older dogs or very young dogs
- Breeds with short noses, such as Bulldogs, Pugs, or Boston Terriers
- Heavy-coated dogs in warm climates

- High heat and humidity
- Previous episode of heat stroke
- Poor ventilation
- Dogs that have other diseases, especially of the heart and lungs

# **CAUSES:**

- Pet is left in a parked car (the most common cause)
- Excessive exercise in hot, humid weather
- Lack of appropriate shelter for an animal outdoors
- Animal is not acclimated to heat
- Lack of availability to cool, fresh water

### **SIGNS:**

- Vigorous panting or difficulty breathing
- Increased rectal temperature of 104 degrees Fahrenheit above
- Weakness, loss of coordination, collapse, loss of consciousness
- Lying down and unwilling or unable to get up
- Thick saliva
- Pale or brick red gums
- Dizziness, disorientation, stu-

por, or appearing in a daze

• Bloody diarrhea or vomiting

### **FIRST AID:**

- Move the dog to a shady area or into air conditioning.
- Spray the dog with cool water.
- Turn on a fan and point it toward the dog.
- Put towels soaked in cool water (don't use ice or very cold water) on the foot pads, head, neck, abdomen, chest, and groin areas.
- Offer the dog some cool water, but don't force it to drink.
- Monitor the dog's temperature. When its body temperature lowers to 104 degrees, stop the cooling process.
- Take your dog to the nearest veterinary hospital immediately, even if the dog seems better.

Heat stroke is a life-threatening emergency. Even animals that survive can suffer long-term damage to their organs. Most animals will require IV fluids and will need their liver and kidney function monitored by a vet for several days. Preventing heat stroke from occurring is always the best medicine!
